Santa Margarita Offers Flexible Pathway to Graduation


Beginning this past school year, Santa Margarita Catholic High School now offers a fully online learning program. Eagle Online Academy provides a premier online education for students seeking a flexible learning environment.

The academy currently offers 30 courses, including Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) classes, covering subjects ranging from Mandarin Chinese and Physics to AP Psychology and Guitar, with additional course offerings planned. All extracurricular opportunities and support services available to on-campus students are accessible to Eagle Online Academy students. The program maintains Santa Margarita's academic rigor and faith-based core values.

Asynchronous classes allow students to log in and complete classwork at the time of day that best fits their schedule. Online learners also have access to weekly video calls with their teachers. For the 2024-2025 school year, Eagle Online Academy is available to students in grades 9-11.

"I love that I can do my ballet classes and private lessons in the morning during school hours and still be a part of the song and dance team at SM!" said Aspen Taylor '27. "This online academy allows me to train at my studio and still be involved at an amazing school. I also love that on the days I am not so busy, I can come to lunch and be on campus just as an in-person student would be!"

Highly qualified SMCHS faculty develop all courses and class content, delivered through Microsoft Teams and OneNote class notebooks with the same rigorous focus as Santa Margarita's successful college-prep curriculum. For a decade, Microsoft has recognized SMCHS as a

Showcase School for excellence in leveraging technology to transform and enhance student-learning outcomes. Santa Margarita is Orange County's sole recipient of this designation and one of just 37 schools nationwide. Microsoft Teams facilitates teacher-student interactions through live meetings as needed, discussion boards and more, while delivering course materials through recorded online presentations, videos and modules. OneNote serves as a digital three-ring binder where students can organize class materials and assignments, allowing teachers to provide real-time feedback.

At the core of Santa Margarita's Eagle Online Academy is the school's charism of Caritas Christi, the love of Christ. Online students can attend on-campus Masses, retreats, faith and fellowship gatherings and participate in the school's Christian service program, where they learn the significance of giving back to their community and their role as global citizens.

"Eagle Online Academy offers students a unique opportunity to blend rigorous academics with the flexibility they need to pursue other passions and commitments, all within the nurturing environment of Santa Margarita's faith-based community," said Ron Blanc, director of the program.

Song Team Celebrates Successful Championship Season

The varsity song team had a winning season that culminated in multiple championship titles. At USA Nationals in Anaheim, the JV and varsity teams took first across the board for all four routines they performed. Earlier in the season, the team placed in the top ten for their pom and jazz routines amidst fierce competition in the large varsity divisions at the National Dance Team Championship in Orlando, Florida. While there, the team also competed in the World Championships and earned first place in the varsity jazz division, securing the highest U.S. team score in the entire competition against routines of all styles.

Seniors Win Congressional App Challenge for Mental Health Support App

Santa Margarita seniors Jevon Mao '24 and Liam Dowd '24, along with their two other teammates, clinched the victory for the 2023 Congressional App Challenge for California's 49th Congressional District. The students developed Ember, an app aimed at enhancing adolescents' mental well-being through the help of close friends and family.

Their success earned them an invitation to the House of Code event held at the U.S. Capitol, where they demonstrated their apps to members of Congress, engaged with fellow award-winning student developers from across the nation, heard from lawmakers, explored the future of computer science and interacted with sponsors and partners including representatives from tech giants at a STEM Expo.

"It was a great opportunity to network with so many industry professionals at such a young age," Mao said. "It was a chance to take what you learn in school and see how to apply it to the real world."

Dowd said the event broadened his awareness of various technology career paths while providing the opportunity to connect with industry leaders.

This marks the second time Mao and Dowd participated in the challenge, having previously developed Project Democracy, an app designed to facilitate unbiased access to voter information in hundreds of languages. Mao will attend Stanford University, where he is interested in studying science, technology and society, and Dowd



plans to major in computer science and business administration at Northeastern University.

Launched in 2015, the Congressional App Challenge promotes science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) education and encourages students to learn coding and computer science skills.



Esports Wins Three National Titles

The esports team, led by Esports General Manager Chase LeBlanc, secured three national titles this year. Teams playing Fortnite D2, Rocket League D1 and Valorant D1 all won their division, bringing the total to seven different esports wins. SMCHS esports now has a new streaming program. Eagle Regiment Wins State Championship

The Eagle Regiment locked in first place in the state championships, making them California State Band Championships (CSBC) Division 1A champions. Awards in music, visual, general effect and percussion were secured with a total score of 78.2.

"I am so proud of these student performers," said Instrumental Music Director Ruben Puebla. "Any large-scale productions will have hiccups, but these performers tackled adversity head-on and put together an incredible show. Their achievement will help to continue a tradition of excellence, passion, and success."

Exceptional Educator: Coleen Barry Named Finalist for Teacher of the Year

Coleen Barry arrives on campus each day at 5:30 a.m. without fail. Each morning, before the sun rises, she's grading papers and preparing for her classes, eager to take on a new day with her students. Barry was recently honored as a finalist for the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Teacher of the Year award, a recognition of the highest honors within the Diocese of Orange. She and other esteemed Catholic educators in Orange County were recognized in February at the Diocese of Orange Celebrating Catholic Education Dinner for their commitment and hard work in making Catholic schools a place of service, faith and academic achievement.

An alumni parent, Barry's career at Santa Margarita Catholic High School began as a substitute teacher. Eighteen years, countless students, and innumerable analyses of "Hamlet" later, Barry says her career at Santa Margarita was "meant to be."

Barry makes sure her classroom is a relaxed environment, and a typical day in room B219 begins with a check-in to ensure students are settled, comfortable, and ready to learn. She hopes students leave her class liking the subject matter more than expected and in a calmer state of mind.

"At a school like Santa Margarita, it's not just the curriculum; it's the whole person," Barry says.

Faculty members who nominated Barry describe her as dedicated, caring and dynamic. Her impact extends far beyond the classroom, shaping students' lives and enriching the educational experience at Santa Margarita.

"She has a wonderful rapport with her students, makes learning fun, and cares about the whole child. She consistently infuses the English curriculum with the heart of Catholicism."

Barry credits her success and this honor to feeling part of a family.



"My colleagues, not only in the English department but all around Santa Margarita, are inspiring to me. The collegiality, the friendliness, and the feeling that you're part of a family—that's what keeps me going."

Drumming Up Good Vibes and Accolades

Santa Margarita Catholic High School Director of Percussion Amanda Duncan is passionate about percussion, bringing her energy and enthusiasm to the classroom and stage as a professional musician. Duncan was recently named by Parenting OC magazine as a School Hero Finalist.

"Ms. Duncan has been a model of quality and consistency in the classroom," said John Hayek, Santa Margarita's vice president of people development. "She takes students from zero experience in steel drums to proficiency and beyond."

Duncan was initially focused on a full-time performance career until her percussion professor and mentor at Cal State Long Beach suggested pursuing a career in education.

"Looking back, I can see that he knew there was an educator inside me way before I ever did," said Duncan, whose teaching career now spans 20 years. "Now, I can't imagine my life without being a teacher."

At Santa Margarita, Duncan teaches steel drums courses, AP Music Theory and various afterschool vocal and instrumental courses



through the school's TAPA conservatory program. She also coaches percussion for the school's Eagle Regiment Marching Band.

Santa Margarita's steel drums program is unique as it's fully integrated into the curriculum rather than an extracurricular activity, Duncan said. Students receive a comprehensive education on the instrument, covering the struggles of its early pioneers in Trinidad and showcasing its musical versatility, ranging from island style to rock to jazz to classical.

"I am fortunate to get the chance to help my students reach their full potential as people and as musicians, challenging them to step outside their comfort zone while introducing them to a whole world of music that they might have never heard of," she said. Beyond teaching, Duncan is an accomplished percussionist and drummer, performing with diverse ensembles, including bands, symphony orchestras, opera companies and musical theatre companies.

"I'm equal parts performer and teacher," she said. "I can bring my practical experience 'on the gig' to my classroom and share what I learn with my students. Additionally, being a teacher makes me a better performer – practicing fundamental music skills is a lifelong pursuit, and I often remind myself of the same things I tell my students to do!"



VISUAL ARTS TEACHER MARTIAL YAPO SHARES MORE ABOUT THE COURSE:

What is the best part of this course?

The most rewarding aspect of this course is the opportunity to ignite a passion for architecture within my students and introduce them to a discipline that could profoundly impact their lives. Whether they embrace architecture or not, they will inevitably navigate a world deeply influenced by it. By exposing them to the intricacies and wonders of architecture, I hope to cultivate a new perspective that enriches their understanding of the built environment.

What is the focus of this course?

This course's primary goal is to broaden students' horizons by immersing them in the world of architecture. I encourage them to step out of their comfort zones and approach problems with fresh perspectives. I seek to empower them to discover their creative potential within architecture through critical thinking and innovative approaches.

BUILDING STRONG FOUNDATIONS in New Elective Course

Santa Margarita's newest class offers students an introduction to architecture, including design thinking, problem-solving and creativity. Taught by Martial Yapo, the visual arts architecture course serves as a valuable foundation, providing students with insight into the architecture world through drawing, sketching, building models, architectural plan reading and other hands-on design projects. Students also gain an understanding of space, form and function while learning about the historical context and various styles of architectural design.

"I was so excited when I found out about this class!" said Charlotte Williams '24. "It's been amazing making my design ideas come to life. Mr. Yapo has done a great job teaching us each step of architecture, from design to building!"

Even for students who may not pursue architecture as a career, the course explores diverse career paths within the design and construction industries. An advanced architecture course is planned for the upcoming school year, diving deeper into architecture while integrating traditional and digital techniques, including architectural drawing, CAD tools and 3D rendering.

What do you want students to get out of this course?

I aspire for my students to recognize their capacity for creativity and harness their critical thinking and analytical skills to conceptualize architectural projects. By merging these two facets, I aim to instill in them the ability to synthesize ideas and translate them into tangible designs that blend artistry with functionality.

What will the main differences be between the beginning and advanced courses?

The advanced architecture course will delve deeper into various aspects of the discipline. We will explore the rich tapestry of architectural history, spanning different movements and examining the evolving principles of sustainability. Additionally, we will scrutinize the intricate details of architectural drawing, honing in on the nuanced layers that contribute to a comprehensive design.

Will students learn Computer-Aided Design (CAD)?

While CAD and rendering will be part of the curriculum, they will not be the sole focus. Instead, students will receive an introduction to these programs, allowing them to familiarize themselves with the tools of the trade. However, emphasis will also be placed on nurturing their creativity through hands-on construction, ensuring a well-rounded understanding of architectural practice.

SPOTLIGHT ON TALENT:

A Vibrant Year for Performing Arts at Santa Margarita



Under the visionary leadership of Kennedy Kemmerer '19, Talon Theatre performers experienced a season of innovation and boundless talent. The theatre program entered a new era with the new artistic director's fresh, creative approach to storytelling and set design.

The 2023-24 theatre season began with a modern twist on a familiar classic, "Alice in Wonderland." Through an abstract exploration of this tale, theatrical design and movement theatre were used to construct a new version of "Alice in Wonderland."

"The student designers were encouraged to push the limits of what they thought the design could be," Kemmerer said. "We were able to articulate, sculpt, and build our own Wonderland in the Talon Dome. With integrated speaker setups, a removed proscenium, and an eccentric color pallete, the students got to lead the design and environmental development for our actors to play in."

The spring musical proved to be an even more adventurous endeavor aboard a 16th-century pirate ship. Schönberg and Boublil's "The Pirate Queen" is based on the real-life story of Grace O'Malley, an Irish chieftan and notorious female pirate in a male-dominated world.

"As we delved into rehearsals, the word 'honesty' became our guiding light," Kemmerer said. "Our goal was not to perform for self-recognition, but to authentically embody the characters and their narratives, inviting the audience into the world of the musical."

The cast was joined on stage by a 10-piece orchestra conducted by Executive Director of Performing Arts Francisco Calvo. Daniel Gallegos '25 was handed the baton as assistant conductor for the "Pirate Queen" orchestra. A highlight for Gallegos was conducting the orchestra for "The Waking of the Queen" during the Saturday performance.

"To this day, I cannot express how grateful I am to Ms. Kemmerer and Mr. Calvo for giving me this life-changing opportunity to be a part of Talon Theatre's production of The Pirate Queen," Gallegos said.




Moody, an artist and retired Santa Margarita visual arts department chair and teacher of 26 years, remains closely tied to the SMCHS community.

"Having the SM Visual Art Show named after me was a total surprise and an honor that means more than words can express," said Moody, who began the school's art show. "I hope this show will let students know how important they are to SM as they live the charism of Caritas Christi."

Visual arts teacher and department chair Corey Lindabury '93, who was taught by Moody when he was a student at SMCHS, said Moody's impact on students has made all the difference in their lives.

"It brings a smile to my face seeing our students show their art to friends and family, as this is what art allows the world to do," Lindabury said. "Art allows us to come together and experience the stories that it tells."

In a preshow awards reception, Moody recognized student artists Emma Murdock '24 and Sydney Sindoni '24 as Artists of Excellence for their artistic excellence and embodying the school's charism of Caritas Christi, the love of Christ, and the four core principles of compassion, humility, justice and goodness. Additionally, student artists featured in art shows across Orange County were acknowledged, and Preston Kwon's '27 piece "Gandalf the Grey" was formally entered into the permanent gallery, a prestigious and highly selective collection featuring Santa Margarita's most talented student artists.

Santa Margarita's visual arts students are bringing joy to cancer patients across Orange County

Dozens of visual artists created custom coloring books for cancer patients at Children's Hospital of Orange County. Once the initial pencil sketches were done by drawing students, graphic design students digitally went over lines to re-draw the pictures. From there, students put the pages together to create each coloring book for their CHOC patient

"We are so glad to be doing something for our community and to bring a little love to these children," said Santa Margarita graphic design teacher Rudy Gardea.

Additionally, select Santa Margarita visual artists were included in the City of Hope Orange County "Hope is a Masterpiece" exhibit at the Lennar Foundation Cancer Center in Irvine. Students were invited to a reception at City of Hope, where they were recognized and celebrated for their contributions. City of Hope Orange County President Annette Walker expressed her gratitude to the artists and their families,

mentioning that they "contributed to a unique patient experience" that makes a daily difference in the lives of patients.

"You are the creators of hope," Walker told the artists gathered for the unveilir ceremony. "It is your work that our patients see when they enter—art that calls to mind home, inspiration, and hope. I hope that as you move through the building, you feel the impact and power of your contributions on our patients, families, and staff"

The exhibit includes 21 pieces by Santa Margarita students.

"This has been a wonderful opportunity for our students to have their artwork displayed for the next six months in this gallery that creates a healing environment for cancer patients," SMCHS Visual Arts Community Outreach Coordinator Nancy Harrell said.

"This helps our students realize their art goes beyond just putting paint to canvas."

After losing their beloved grandmother to cancer, Santa Margarita twins Brooke and Emma Murdock '24 felt inspired to honor her legacy while uplifting their

The sisters started the school's Comfort Cross Club their freshman year, which has grown to include 170 members. Repurposed wood from their father's company that has been blessed is used to make small wooden crosses, each etched with the SM logo and accompanied by a prayer card that includes the biblical verse:





"Now may the Lord of peace Himself give you peace always in every way. The Lord be with you all." -2 Thessalonians: 3:16

Their grandmother, who remained courageous and strong throughout her illness, had tiny pendants, crosses, pillows and prayer cards that helped comfort her and those around her. Club members regularly distribute Comfort Crosses throughout campus and have also delivered hundreds of handmade crosses to St. Joseph's Hospital cancer patients.

"We make these crosses and prayer cards in honor of our grandmother and hope they bring strength and comfort to anyone who receives them," said Emma Murdock '24. "Our goal is to help comfort people who are struggling physically or emotionally, so they know they are never alone."

Their younger brother, Bryan Murdock '26, plans to lead the club after his sisters graduate with the assistance of Layla Amer '25.



CHARISM

"Caritas Christi" is sewn into the fabric of Santa Margarita Catholic High School, the stitching that begins to form when students arrive and the seams that bind them together as they leave the gates for the final time as students. Compassion, humility, justice and goodness are the core principles that define Santa Margarita's charism of Caritas Christi, which means "the love of Christ."

CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

Santa Margarita's charism is the guiding light, bringing students back to what matters. The school's chaplaincy program is one of the ways we live that charism daily. In its second full year, the chaplaincy program places faith at the center of athletics and reinforces consistent, intentional faith formation for teams.

"The chaplaincy program was started from an organic desire to connect the faith life of the school and a student's spiritual journey with their sport," says baseball chaplain and Assistant Principal of Mission and Integration Patrick Visconti '06. "The chaplain's role is to serve as an additional adult an athlete can go to for support and guidance."

While it is ultimately up to each coach as to where chaplains fit into practice and game schedules, the idea is that a team's chaplain will meet with their designated team weekly. These sessions allow teams to carve out time to ask big questions, to put their athletic performance into perspective, and allow for faith and spirituality to have a central role in the life of athletics on campus.

Seven Santa Margarita teams currently have chaplains as part of their coaching staff. By design, these chaplains are figures on campus that students see daily; Assistant Director of Campus Ministry Donnie Green, Vice President of People Development John Hayek, and Principal Cheri Wood are all chaplains for various teams. Teams that do not yet have chaplains still have designated faith formation sessions during their season. Many coaches opt to have multiple faith formations per season to help ground, relax and refocus their athletes. Visconti's vision for the chaplaincy program is for every athletic program on campus to have a chaplain.

Head Baseball Coach Chris Malec '01 says that the chaplaincy program helped transform how his players see faith fitting into the daily things they go through as a team.

"The program helps us build trust through vulnerability with our student-athletes, as it creates opportunities for our athletes to share their lives with each other."

Varsity soccer player Ruby Casey '24 says her faith has been shaped by her sport and her coach at Santa Margarita. When the team began their run for the championship during her junior year, Casey says it was one of the most exciting yet intense experiences she'd ever endured. She realized she had to rely on God to get her through the games, something she'd learned through her athletic experiences at Santa Margarita. Her prayer was this: "Help me do my best, win or lose."

"SM has shaped me into an athlete who exemplifies my faith on the field, and Coach Craig (Bull) has taught us to be players with character," Casey says. "As I go on to play in college, I know God will go with me, and my prayer will be the same as it has through high school: help me do my best, win or lose."

Spending time in reflection within the stillness of the Sacred Heart Chapel before a home playoff game, girls soccer chaplain Principal Wood read aloud players' pregame intentions: let go of stress, support and encourage the frontline, open up to my teammates, stop comparing myself, remain positive, and keep focused even amid frustration.

"What you are is a phenomenal team - you are all in this together," Wood reminded the student-athletes.

CARING FOR THE WHOLE PERSON

Faith is infused into all extracurricular programs at Santa Margarita. Beyond the classroom, the school's extracurricular programs strive to enfold, ground, and care for the whole person, mind, body and soul. Through service projects, communal prayer, and dedicated program retreats, students have opportunities for spiritual growth and reflection.

Before competing at the FIRST Robotics Competition this spring, team members were led through the Stations of the Cross on campus with Santa Margarita Chaplain Rev. Florante Moren.

"Our robotics team enjoys participating in the Stations of the Cross every Lenten season just before Easter," said Robotics Coordinator Chase LeBlanc. "It allows us to refocus on what's important."

The Eagles football program recently took a day away from the field for their "Men of God" retreat. The focus was being rooted in God's love and "H.O.W." to become closer to Him.

"By being Honest, Open and Willing, the Eagle brotherhood continues to grow stronger in their relationship with God and one another," said SMCHS Head Football Coach Anthony Rouzier, who says his role as a coach is to serve and impact. "... Being at a Catholic school we get to share God's word – that's a focal point of our

conversations as coaches and with the kids. Our purpose is to build champions – and that's champions in life."

Talon Theatre connects and shares Christ's love with one another before their performances. Talon Theatre student Elaina Martinez '24 says it makes all the difference in performances.

"Talon Theatre's traditions are meant to allow students to be vulnerable without judgment, which is what makes them so special," Martinez says. "Our unique practices make our program feel like home, and our bonds as a community are built on traits like trust, gratitude and love."

Talon Theatre Artistic Director Kennedy Kemmerer '19 encourages her students to approach the challenges they face on stage with empathy and thoughtful problem-solving, considering the experiences and emotions their peers may also be navigating. Rehearsals often begin with meditation, a devotional reading, and a one-word check-in.

"This has become imperative for setting us up for success as a team so we can interact with Caritas Christi at the forefront of our work," says Kemmerer. "... Theatre uses our gifts and talents to provide storytelling to audiences who may need to hear its message. Empowering Student-Athletes for Recruiting Success

It's not often a person enjoys a second opportunity at a "dream job," yet here I am, after a 40-year sports journalism career that culminated in a post as sports editor of the Los Angeles Times, having more fun and feeling more fulfilled than ever.

When I came to Santa Margarita Catholic High School in January 2021, I was a volunteer baseball coach. After about only six weeks of retirement, I figured coaching was a way to stave off restlessness while giving back to a game I enjoyed.

Little did I know that after the baseball season, President Andy Sulick '91 would schedule a meeting and ask me how SM might best benefit from my "skill set" on campus. From that conversation, Santa Margarita's student-athlete recruiting support program was born. In my role, I collaborate with student-athletes, coaches, college counselors and families as a college-fit advisor, helping to facilitate opportunities for student-athletes interested in competing in college. Through parent presentations, one-on-one meetings, and educating families on best practices, this added value program comes at no cost to families and provides the recruiting support a student-athlete needs to take control of their future.

With more than 75% of the student body participating in athletics during their time at Santa Margarita, our goal is to find a happy home – academically, athletically and socially – for any student-athlete who has a passion they wish to cultivate during the college years.

Last school year, in only the program's second year of operation, 73 SMCHS Class of 2023 student-athletes found scholarships and roster spots on four-year college teams. That was about 17% of the



entire graduating class – and believed to be a single-class record for Santa Margarita. Once again, 17% of the graduating Class of 2024 will continue their athletic careers at the college level.

Of course, the credit for that goes primarily to an extremely talented class of outstanding athletes who, largely, also were strong students. Some of them, no doubt, would have earned scholarships no matter what high school they attended. But as SM students, they had a bestin-the-business support system: tireless coaches, many whom have built trusting bonds with college programs; resourceful academic and college counselors; a supportive administration, faculty and staff; and a fabulous recruiting platform that allows student-athletes to build a full athletic/academic resume and, with just a few keystrokes, efficiently send it via a national database to the email inbox of just about any college coach in the country. The platform is SportsRecruits.com, and the pro version is available - at no charge - to all SM student-athletes, including those who exclusively compete for clubs. Student-athletes can efficiently research schools based on preferences, communicate with college coaches, generate exposure and uncover opportunities to ultimately help them play the sport they love at their best-fit college.

Yes, working with some of the industry's top sports journalists while covering the Olympics, NBA championships, World Series and college national championships was challenging and fun. But encouraging a young woman who was ready to give up on her favorite sport and top college choice, and seeing her later earn a scholarship in that sport to that college; or helping a young man who was seeking a volunteer football operations post instead land a paying job producing creative graphics for a school in one of the nation's top media markets? Now that's rewarding!

HISERMAN HINTS

- Know your sport's NCAA
 recruiting calendar: There are
 periods when some college
 coaches can contact you and
 recruit you, and periods when
 they can't.
- Register with the NCAA Eligibility
 Center if you hope to be recruited
 by an NCAA school. Unless a D1
 or D2 school is already recruiting
 you, choose the free account.
 You can always upgrade later.
- Compete in the classroom as hard as you do on the field or court. The better your academic record, the more options you have.
- Take advantage of SM resources:
 Coaches, academic and college counselors, SportsRecruits, and a college relations advisor dedicated to working with student-athletes are all available to you.
- Visit colleges and speak with people on campus. Get a feel for what you like and don't like, then trust your instincts.
- Research colleges online early in your high school career and be prepared to deliver a full athletic/academic resume to programs that interest you before the start of your junior year.
- Tune out the noise: Friends and their parents can be the worst sources for recruiting and college "offers." Focus on becoming the best student and athlete you can be.
- Bust the myths: You'll hear that D3 is the lowest rung of four-year college competition and that those schools don't offer scholarships. Many D3 programs compete at a high level and reward strong students with sizeable merit scholarships.

 Also: It's rarely "too late" to be recruited. There have been SM student-athletes who were offered athletic scholarships even weeks after they graduated.

SANTA MARGARITA SOARS:

A HISTORIC 2023-24 ATHLETIC SEASON


Santa Margarita Catholic High School etched itself further in the history books during the 2023-2024 school year, winning CIF state, regional, southern section and Trinity League titles as well as individual student-athlete and coach of the year honors. During its 37-year history, Santa Margarita has consistently ranked among the most competitive schools

in the nation for athletics. The school's athletic program seeks to provide students with the opportunity to strengthen their physical and mental abilities in a competitive, Christ-centered environment, developing the student-athlete in every aspect – spiritually, intellectually, physically, emotionally and socially.

GIRLS GOLF

Santa Margarita's girls golf team continued their winning ways as back-to-back CIF state champions, becoming the first Trinity League school to win multiple state championships in girls golf. The team's successful sweep also included securing their fifth straight Trinity League championship title, the CIF-SS Division 1 title, and second straight CIF-SCGA SoCal Regional team championship following a fifth consecutive undefeated season. Coached by Jill Hegna, Santa Margarita's girls golf program is nationally recognized as a powerhouse program. Following the clean sweep season, the Orange County Register named Hegna Girls Golf Coach of the Year and Leigh Chien '24 Girls Golf Player of the Year.





CHEER

Varsity cheer had a standout season, with the girls taking home the school's first CIF-SS Division 1 AA title this past winter, making Santa Margarita history. Head Coach Dana Maas '92, who has been coaching at Santa Margarita for 27 seasons, was awarded CIF-SS Coach of the Year for Division 1 AA, and three of the program's student-athletes earned all-CIF honors.

"While we've had success on the national stage before, this victory is significant because it represents a breakthrough for our program within our local community," Maas said.

GIRLS SOCCER

Girls varsity soccer won the Trinity League title and CIF State Division 1 Regional championship this season, continuing their success from last year. In the CIF State Regional championship game, the girls played for a grueling 95 minutes, and the contest ended in their favor after penalty kicks. Fourteen SMCHS players received post-season accolades, including USC-commit Faith George '24, who was named OC Register Player of the Year for the second year. The program is under the leadership of Head Coach Craig Bull.





BOYS VOLLEYBALL

Boys varsity volleyball took home the CIF-SS Division 2 title this spring. The team had a victorious run in the regular season and went through the CIF-SS playoffs without losing a single set. Head Coach Sinan Tanik, awarded CIF Division 2 Coach of the Year, led the team through their winning season, bringing the Southern Section title back home for the first time since 2001. Five SMCHS players earned Trinity League and CIF honors, including UCSB-bound Ethan Saint '24, who was awarded CIF Division 2 Player of the Year.

BOYS AND GIRLS SWIMMING AND DIVING

Santa Margarita's swimming and diving teams make up the only high school program in CIF history to win both the girls and boys CIF state titles in the same year, and after this season, they have done so two years in a row. The teams swept the competition, taking home Trinity League titles, the CIF-SS Division 1 titles, and the CIF Division 1 state titles all this year. At the CIF State meet, the boys team scored a meet record of 248 points, outdoing the runner-up by 51.5 points. The girls

team earned their fifth consecutive state title by scoring 210 points. Teagan O'Dell'25 was named the Orange County Register Girls Swimmer of the Year for the third year, and Daniel Verdolaga'24, who will be swimming for West Point, was named the Orange County Register Boys Swimmer of the Year. Led by Rich and Ron Blanc, the brothers have built a nationally recognized high school swim dynasty at Santa Margarita.
